Here's some areas I want to cover if elected:

Representation

- Local representation is so important for our campuses across the TU. I've sat on both local and national boards representing you, our students for the last year. As your deputy I want to ensure equality of services and resources across the campuses.
- Over the past 5 years I have fought passionately to reduce the barriers students face accessing higher education.
- I want to see an increase in student representation on boards and committees across the university. The student voice is paramount in the transition back to campus.

Equality

- One issue that is plain to see is the lack of diversity within the union and student council. We represent a
 wide diverse student population so we should reflect that. It is great that we have student representatives
 from diverse background involved, but I want more. I mean more students with disabilities, more mature
 students, more students from different cultural backgrounds and more students of colour.
- We have a fantastic access office on the Tallaght campus, who I've built a strong relationship with this year.
 They work on various supports for students such as Student Assistance Fund, Childcare Assistance Fund, The crèche, access routes to name a few. If elected deputy I want to work with he access office to develop more supports for students.

Coru

• Undoubtedly there has been issues with Coru before this pandemic. However, Covid has seen major issues with placements for students. This is not just a local, but a national issue. What it has highlighted is the difficulty for both students and educators to engage with Coru in a meaningful way. We want some clear-cut black & white guidance from them and what we are getting is all grey! I'm not saying I can sort this all out, that would be a lie, no one person can, but I have been engaged both locally and nationally in work to get meaningful engagement from Coru. If elected I would continue to push this issue.

Unity

 Following on from those two points I believe in the power of the student voice. From my work with USI and students on a national level to address the Coru issues has thought me there is a strength, and wealth of ideas when people come together. I believe if we can get more students involved from all walks of life and come together, that strength in numbers will drive the needs of students to the forefront when we are living with life after Covid.

Care after Covid

• That leads me to my final point (for now!). There is no doubt that students have suffered throughout this pandemic and continue to suffer. The measures implemented by the government such as increasing student assistance fund, increases in funding towards mental health services on campus, and the €250 one off payment were all welcomed and much needed. But students have been studying remotely for the last year and its going to be difficult to transition back to 'normal' college life. I want to work towards ensuring that the good things like, remote learning for those who find it difficult to attend, can be kept and that there's factors to mitigate the negative effects, like lobbying for continued increase for SAF and mental health funding.

So, now let's look at why you should vote for me:

- 1. Local One reason I want to be your deputy president is because I genuinely care about students' rights and wellbeing not just in the overall TU but on our campus. I am a Tallaght native who studied on Tallaght campus, so I am familiar with issues that students from Tallaght and surrounding areas face. I want to ensure going forward that the voice of Tallaght students is represented and, heard.
- 2. Experienced I am not afraid to ask the difficult questions or raise the contentious issues. As a class rep I had to raise issues on behalf of my class often, and it was uncomfortable at times, but I always persevered and spoke up, because it was needed and the right thing to do.
